Through a series of hilarious mishaps, Tito receives a double dose of tranquilizers, causing the general manager to believe he is dead and setting off a chain reaction of slapstick and mistaken identity. Lots of laughs were shared by all.

The Portland Urban Scenic Tour

A small but enthusiastic group ventured out in protest of what Mother Nature tried to through at us. After snow fell throughout different areas, both Friday morning and that evening, Saturday, March 25 was dry.

Our first stop was at Rocky Butte State Park and Joseph Wood Hill Park. Rocky Butte is an extinct volcanic cinder cone butte with steep forested slopes visible from Interstates 205 and 84. In 1901, Joseph Wood Hill established Hill Military Academy in northwest Portland. He soon moved his school to the Rocky Butte area. Many street names in this neighborhood refer to Hill's Academy. Now Joseph Wood Hill Park is located at the top. The former Rocky Butte jail is just below the crest of the peak.

The views are spectacular on a nice day; including Mt. St. Helens, Silver Star Mt. and Mt. Hood. The girls might have broken into a snow ball fight that Grandpa started.







Club News

Our second stop was at Mt. Tabor Park. Portland's Mt. Tabor, is another volcanic cinder cone, and was named by Plympton Kelly, son of Oregon City pioneer resident Clinton Kelly, after Mt. Tabor in Israel, six miles east of Nazareth. In 1894, the city built two open reservoirs on the site (two other open reservoirs were built in 1911). By 1900, Portland's growing eastside population demanded park space; in 1903 landscape architect John C. Olmsted recommended the city obtain more land at Mt. Tabor. In 1909, the Board of Park Commissioners used voter-approved bonds to buy approximately forty lots on Mt. Tabor for \$366,000.

Portland Parks Superintendent Emanuel Tillman Mische, who had worked with the Olmsted Brothers' landscape design firm in Massachusetts, developed a naturalistic design for the park. The plan included long flights of stairs, gently curving parkways, numerous walking trails, and a nursery yard. It also showcased native plants. In 1912, construction workers discovered volcanic cinders which were later utilized in surfacing the park's roads.

From the reservoir side of the park you can see right into the heart of downtown Portland.

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The third and final stop before lunch was Powel Butte Nature Park. Powell Butte, is also an extinct cinder cone volcano, rising near the headwaters of Johnson Creek - an urban creek with remnant populations of native salmon and steelhead. The park is comprised of 611 acres of meadowland and forest.

Before the turn of the century, the large meadow area was cleared and an orchard planted by the first settlers. In 1925 the City of Portland purchased the land from George Wilson for future water reservoirs, but continued to lease the northeast portion of the property to Henry Anderegg, a farmer and owner of Meadowland Crest Dairy, until 1948 when the farming was discontinued. However, dairy cattle were permitted to graze on the acreage to preserve the pastures. In the mid-1970s, the Water Bureau prepared a development plan for Powell Butte that called for the construction of four 50-million gallon underground reservoirs to be located at the north end of the butte. In 1981, the first reservoir was built. A second 50-million gallon underground reservoir was constructed in 2014. These reservoirs serve as the hub of the Water Bureau's distribution system.

In 1987, the City officially established Powell Butte as a nature park and the park was opened to the public in 1990. The nature park is managed by Portland Parks & Recreation.

Today, miles of trails accommodate hikers, mountain bikers, and horseback riders. Abundant wildlife populates the park, including rabbits, ring-necked pheasants, ground squirrels, raccoons, gray foxes, skunks, bats, chipmunks, coyotes, and black-tailed mule deer. The park is home to many birds of prey with its open meadows, groves of wild hawthorn trees, forested slopes of Western red cedar, and wetlands near Johnson Creek.

From Powel Butte you can also see Mt. St. Helens and Silver Star Mt, but to the East you are looking directly at Mt. Hood.





This Month in History

April 1928 - 1931

Monday, April 1, 1929

Industrialist William C. Durant addressed telegrams to 100 leading executives asking them if they agreed with the suggestion of the Federal Reserve Board that market prices of the securities of their companies were artificially high. "At a time when banking reserves of the country are in no way threatened, the Federal Reserve Board, by questioning the right of banks to loan on stock market collateral, is giving the public the impression that our best securities are selling above their market value", Durant wrote in the telegram. "It is my belief that the attitude of the Board, the method of handling and the thoughtless character of the publicity are most harmful to our business interests and threatening the prosperity of the country.

Friday, April 4, 1930

The American Interplanetary Society was founded to conduct rocket experiments. In 1934 the organization changed its name to the American Rocket Society. In 1963, merged with the Institute of the Aerospace Sciences to become AIAA.

Friday, April 12, 1929

Arches National Park in Utah was named a National Monument.

Charles Lindbergh, accompanied by his wife Anne, flew a Lockheed Model 8 Sirius from Los Angeles to New York in 14 hours, 45 minutes and 32 seconds, a new transcontinental record.


Sunday, April 26, 1931






The Broadway Melody won the award for Outstanding Picture.

The Best Actress went to Mary Pickford for her role in, Coquette, as Norma Besant.





How to Do a Lube Job on a Model A Ford

This article is written and edited by Eirik N. Huset from a Closed Caption translation of a YouTube video "How to Do a Lube Job on a Model A Ford" by Mark Hayward. The original video can be located with the link as follows. https://youtu.be/A7ALPB2wsmc

Hi, I am Mark Hayward and with Christine's help, we are going to go through how to do a lube job on a Model A Ford. Just about everything, you need to know, to work on a Model A is in the Model A Ford Mechanics handbook by Les Andrews. If you do not already have this book, you should be sure to add it to your library. We are going to be working out of the service adjustments section. This section has great charts, showing how to and what to do for all of the lubrication on your Model A. It also shows where all the locations are, and it has a schedule of when each particular item needs to be lubricated. As far as I know this schedule is the authority on what needs to be lubricated, how and when. If you do everything that is included in this section, you are doing right by your Model A.

INSTRUCTIONS

This lubricating chart gives full information for lubricating the MODEL. A FORD. Proper lubrication has a vital effect on the life of the car. Consequently you should follow these instructions very carefully.

Each MODEL A came equipped with a pressure gan, By means of this device, lubricant can be forced under high pressure into all bearings provided with conical shaped fittings. To fill the gun, remove the top cap and plunger assembly. Fill the barrel with lubricant and pack the lubricant solidly. Fill only to the top of the lettering on the outside of the barrel.

COMPRESSOR LUBRICATING GUN





Lubricate every 500 miles. (Pressure gun), Use Number Two high pressure lubricant in all high pressure lubricating fittings.



Every 500 miles lubricate water pump shaft through water pump lubricating fitting, use water pump grease (Pressure gun).



Every 2000 miles remove the plug on the top of the steering gear housing and add gear lubricant (600W) until it reaches the level of the filler plug bole. Never use high pressure lubricant in the steering gear.



Every 1000 miles put two or three drops of oil in the front oil hole of the generator. The front oil hole is protected by a small cover. Do not put more than the recommended amount of oil in the oil hole as there is the possibility of oil getting on the brashes and affecting the operation of the generator.



Every 2000 miles fill the oil cup at the rear of the generator. This is fed by a felt to the rear bearing.



Every 5000 miles repack the front wheel bearings with a short fiber sodium soap grease having a high melting point.

Every 500 miles put a few drops of oil in oil holes at each end of the accelerator control shaft.

MODEL A



Make sure radiator is kept filled with clean fresh water (a good anti-rust and water pump lubricant is suggested). During the winter in extremely cold areas be sure and use a good anti-freeze solution.



Every 500 miles put oil in the oil cup at the side of the distributor. Add sufficient oil to reach the level of the oil cup.



Every 2000 miles remove the distributor cap, clean lobes of the cam and apply a thin film of vasoline. The distributor should be kept clean and well oiled. First you need a grease gun designed to snap on the grease fittings.


The quantity column on this page actually refers to the number of grease fittings. In particular, the location, not the amount of grease to put in every fitting. Most fittings get two squirts of grease from the grease gun, with the exception of the throw out bearing and the rear axle bearing.




We start with the right front spindles. There are two fittings, and they are hard to reach it depending on your grease gun. If you don't have a flexible nozzle, and mine does not, then you have to turn the wheels in order to have access to this particular fitting. Items one through six on the lubrication chart, they are all clustered together at the front of the vehicle. Therefore, we just did them all at once. The nozzle snaps right on to the grease fitting and these all call for two squirts of grease each. You want to make sure that you are getting the old, dirty grease out. Sometimes you have to use more grease, if there is no grease coming out. As Christine was squirting the grease into this one we could not see it coming out anywhere. It is always good to look carefully before you keep pumping grease in. In this case there is a giant glob of grease sticking out the back. It is important to keep a lot of rags handy, because you are going to need them. You then turn the wheels the other way, so we can have access to the other end of the tie rod. This fitting is positioned underneath the suspension arm and it is a little hard to get to. We turn the wheel all the way to the right so we could get to both ends of the drag link. That one on the front end is the tough one to get to.






The shock absorbers are the last item on the chasse to look at. For the shocks, you want to use shock oil. The way you do it is you remove a bolt, look inside to see the level and just fill it up.



In the center of the car you have the emergency break cross shaft, U-joints and transmission.




This illustration shows the Emergency Break Tube with grease fittings on each side.

The throw-out bearing only needs to be lubricated every 2,000 miles. It just needs one squirt. To get to it, you take the floor matte out and remove the little panel for the steering box.





For the transmission, you can use 600-weight oil, as Henry Ford intended. You fill it up to the point that when you stick your finger in the hole, you can feel the oil. I have been using STP Gear Oil in my transmission and steering box for the entire time I have had my Model A. Christine came up with a brilliant innovation to check this, using the honey bear nozzle for a honey bottle. The whole reason why I am using STP and not the 600-weight is because that bottle is too long to fit under the car.







Moving onto the back end of the car, there are a few fittings on the rear backing plate. It is a good idea to wipe off the fittings before you to put fresh grease in. You don't want to force any gunk into the car. One thing that I have learned working on old cars is it's not always as glamorous and graceful. As I expected, despite it being awkward and difficult at times, my favorite place in the world is to be under my Model A. Now we will check the oil level in the differential. On the rear axle, we are going to pop the plug off, to make sure there is enough oil in there. If you do not have the specific tool that is made for it, just stick the tip of your finger in. When you decide that your oil is dirty, you drain it out, making sure to reinstall your plug. Fill it up and recheck.






In the engine compartment, there are several items to look at.

There are a lot of different kinds of water pumps. Some of them only require lubrication on one of the two grease fittings. So look for which one you have. Make sure you are lubricating it the right way that yours requires. For mine, I only have the front grease fitting.






The accelerator control shaft takes just a couple drops of regular oil. The distributor cam only requires just one q-tip full of Vaseline. If you have a generator, a couple spots need oil.



The horn is my favorite part of the car. We have to make sure that is working right. For the horn you just need a couple drops of oil on the felt pad. The felt pad is in the back.



When you have to take the wheels off the car, it is a good idea to loosen the lug nuts before you jack the car completely up. That way you still have some friction to keep the wheel from spinning, when you turn the wrench.

Anytime you are working on your car, you should keep an eye out for other things that might need to be fixed. While looking at the wheel bearings with the wheels off, the sparkles in the grease on this wheel bearing are not glitter from some party going on inside the hub. Unfortunately, they are metal flakes, and are a sign that this wheel bearing is disintegrating. I am going to order new ones, but for now I'll just demonstrate how to repack the grease in a wheel bearing. Take some wheel bearing and chassis grease, put a big glob of it on your palm. Then you take the edge of the bearing and press it down into the glob of grease. What you're doing here is you are trying to force the grease up in between the two layers of the bearing. You want to keep doing this, keep pressing down forcing grease into the bottom side, until you see the grease start to come out of the top of the bearing. You might see some of the dirty old grease start to come out. You want to do this all the way around. Keep doing it on all sides until you get grease to come out from the entire circumference of the bearing. You can do this wrong and it can get expensive.

Well that is it. That is how you do a lube job on a Model A Ford. So get in there, get your hands greasy and get the job done. Than get out there and drive. That is really, what the cars are best used for.

Recipe of the Month

In honor of National Grilled Cheese Month, the easiest of all sandwiches to make, The Pioneer Women has 17 of the best-grilled cheese sandwiches listed on their website. The key is always the cheese, but most people will agree a great tomato soup goes hand and hand with the sandwich. There are several ways to change the sandwich also, selection of breads and fixings to start with. Bacon and tomatoes are common, but try sliced cucumbers or medley of sliced bell peppers. The following is my take...

Ingredients: 4 slices of sourdough bread, ½ cup shredded sharp cheddar, ½ cup shredded Havarti, ½ cup shredded Gouda, 4 slices of Tillamook horseradish Swiss, ¼ cup chopped basil, ¼ cup chopped green onion, 1 tablespoon minced garlic, 8 tablespoon of salted butter, 2-4 tablespoons of parmesan cheese and 2-4 tablespoons of everything bagel spice. My favorite fixing is 4 stripes of pepper bacon, crispy.

Melt half the butter with basil, green onion and garlic to make a spread for the inside of the bread. Melt rest of butter and turn the bread to toast the outside. Add the sliced cheese first, then layers of the shredded cheeses. Cover briefly to melt cheese add fixings and fold together. Sprinkle spice and parmesan cheese on the outside crust. Cut and serve.




