At the party we need to finish up our elections by finding a vice president.

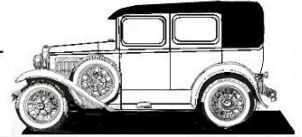

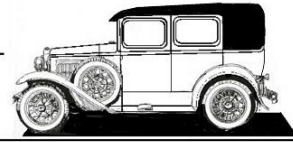

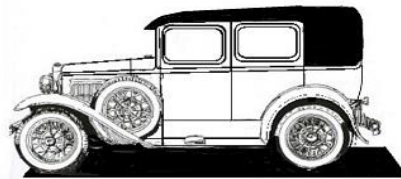
REFRESHMENTS: Thanks to Eirik & Karen Huset!!!

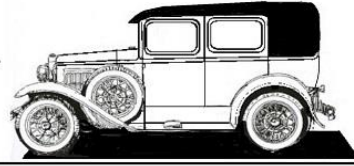

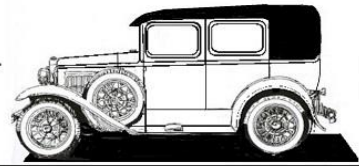

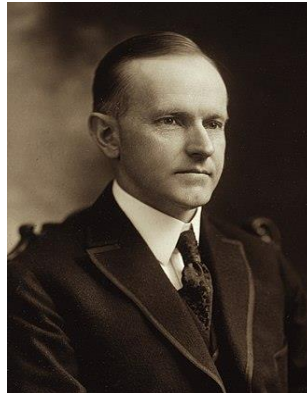
This Month in History

November 1928 - 1931

1928



4 - U.S. President **Calvin Coolidge** delivered his sixth and final State of the Union message to Congress.

10 - The 1928 Nobel Prizes were awarded. The recipients were Owen Richardson of the United Kingdom for Physics, Adolf Windhaus of Germany (Chemistry), Charles Nicolle of France (Medicine) and Sigrid Undset of Norway (Literature). The Peace Prize was not awarded.

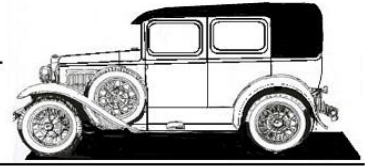
12 - President Calvin Coolidge welcomed representatives of 34 nations at the opening of the International Civil Aeronautics Conference in Washington, D.C. The three-day gathering commemorated the 25th anniversary of the first flight, and was the first significant event to recognize the achievement of the Wright brothers. Orville Wright was honored, and escorted Charles Lindbergh to the platform to receive the Harmon Trophy.

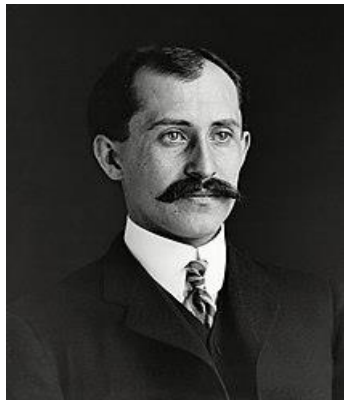

17 - Orville Wright was honored in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, on the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Wright brothers' historic flight, as a granite boulder was unveiled to mark the spot of the flight and the cornerstone of a government memorial was laid. Secretary of War Dwight F. Davis, Governor Angus Wilton McLean, National Aeronautic Association President Hiram Bingham and aviator Amelia Earhart were all in attendance.



26 - Dubble Bubble Gum, the first brand of chewing gum that allowed for blowing bubbles cleanly, was first sold by the Fleer Chewing Gum Company of Philadelphia under the brand name "Dubble Bubble". The invention of Walter E. Diemer, an accountant for the Fleer candy company, bubble gum differed from previous candies in that it could not only expand with air, but was easy to remove from the skin once popped.



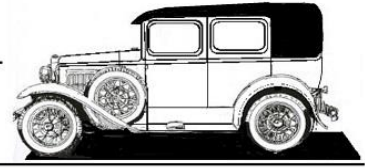

1929

3 - President Hoover delivered his first State of the Union message to Congress.



10 - The 1929 Nobel Prizes were awarded. The recipients were Louis de Broglie of France for Physics, Arthur Harden of the United Kingdom and Hans von Euler-Chelpin of Sweden (Chemistry), Christiaan Eijkman and Sir Frederick Gowland Hopkins of the United Kingdom (Physiology or Medicine), Thomas Mann of Germany (Literature) and Frank Billings Kellogg of the United States (Peace).

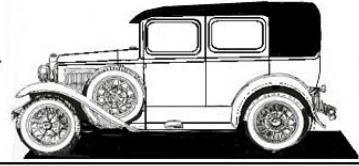
24 - The West Wing of the White House was seriously damaged in an evening fire. President Hoover left a Christmas Eve reception for children in order to direct efforts to retrieve important documents, but not all records could be saved. It was the most serious fire at the White House since it was burned by the British in 1814.



The Ohio Supreme Court declined to review the James H. Snook murder case, so his execution was scheduled for January 31. James Howard Snook was an American athlete, veterinarian, and murderer. He is the only Olympic gold medalist to be executed for murder.

1930

2 - U.S. President Herbert Hoover gave his second State of the Union message to Congress. Like the previous year, it was delivered as a written message.^[3] "In the larger view", Hoover stated, "the major forces of the depression now lie outside the United States".

10 - The 1930 Nobel Prizes were awarded in Stockholm. The recipients were Sir Chandrasekhara Venkata Raman of India for Physics, Hans Fischer of Germany (Chemistry), Karl Landsteiner of Austria (Physiology or Medicine), Sinclair Lewis of the United States (Literature), while in Oslo Nathan Söderblom was awarded the Peace Prize.

20 - President Hoover signed a \$110 million emergency construction bill and a \$45 million drought relief bill as part of a program of federal aid made necessary by the Great Depression.

31 - Adolphus Busch Orthwein, the 13-year-old grandson of Anheuser-Busch CEO August Anheuser Busch, Sr., was kidnapped by a masked gunman in Huntleigh, Missouri, and held for ransom. The father of the boy's kidnapper rescued the child and returned him to the Orthwein family the next day.^[59] His father was Percy Orthwein and his mother, Clara Busch.

1931

3 - *Alka-Seltzer* was first brought on the market by the Dr. Miles Medical Company.



5 - The Mahatma Gandhi left England to head back to India. "I return with a clear conscience", Gandhi said. "I have explored and exhausted every approach to peace."^[8] That evening in Paris, Gandhi gave a speech at the Magic-City dance hall and took questions from the audience of 2,000 people.

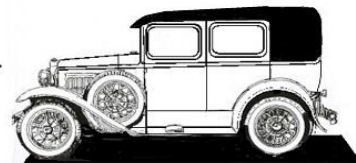
8 - Herbert Hoover delivered the annual State of the Union message to Congress. The message reviewed the worldwide depression and laid out the measures the government was taking to alleviate the crisis, but made no mention of Prohibition.

10 - The 1931 Nobel Prizes were awarded in Stockholm. The recipients were Carl Bosch and Friedrich Bergius of Germany for Chemistry, Otto Heinrich Warburg of Germany (Medicine) and Erik Axel Karlfeldt of Sweden (Literature). The Peace Prize was awarded in Oslo to Jane Addams and Nicholas Murray Butler of the United States. The Physics Prize was not awarded that year.

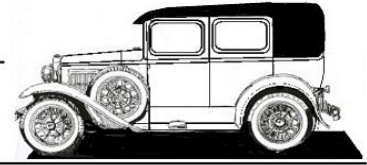

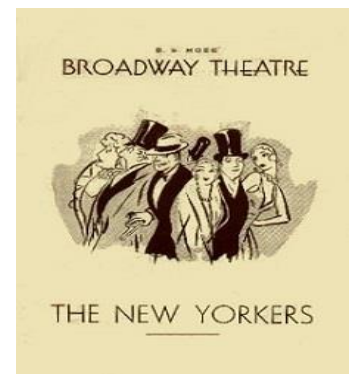

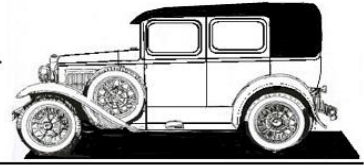
25 - The musical film *Hit the Deck* premiered in Los Angeles.



30 - The Cole Porter musical revue *Wake Up and Dream* premiered at the Selwyn Theatre on Broadway.

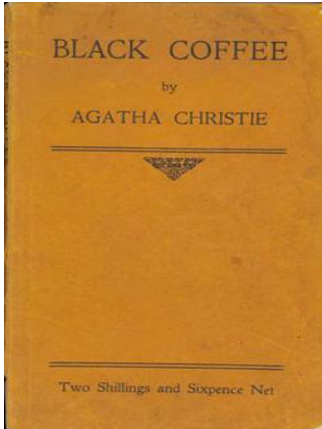

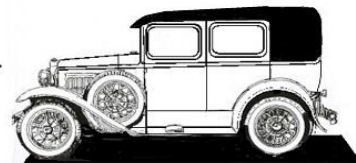


15 - Chicago Stadium, an arena used by the National Hockey League's Chicago Blackhawks, hosted the first indoor game in National Football League history. Before an estimated 10,000 fans, the Chicago Bears defeated the crosstown Cardinals, 9 to 7.

25 - The first Metropolitan Opera network radio broadcast took place when the Engelbert Humperdinck opera Hansel and Gretel aired on NBC.

26 - The George and Ira Gershwin musical Of Thee I Sing premiered at the Music Box Theatre on Broadway.^[37]

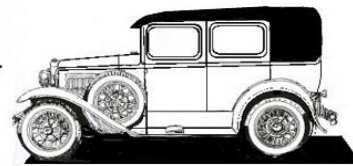

The History of Christmas Tree Decorations

In 1928 the using of electric lights on the Christmas tree was encouraged, instead of the long-held tradition of lit candles clipped to branches. The flicker of the Christmas-tree candles among the green boughs of the Christmas tree is a beautiful sight, but so many lives have been lost thru fires caused by the candles igniting the trees.

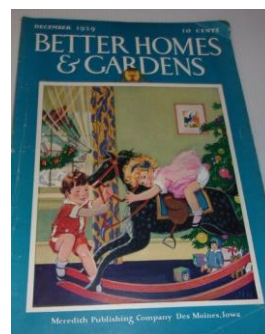


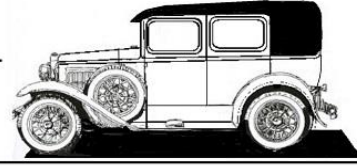
String lights were not a brand new technology—stores had been using them in displays for years—but it wasn't until the end of the 1920s that electric lights were affordable for the average family.



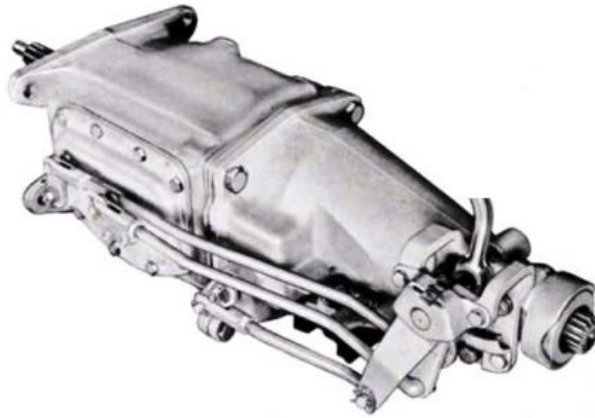
First Lady Lou Henry Hoover was the first to decorate an "official" Christmas tree in the Blue Room in 1929. Ever since, each of the first ladies have carried on the tradition.

Depression-era holidays were different. Christmas trees were decorated with handmade ornaments as well as food like popcorn and cranberries. Magazines like *Better Homes & Gardens* published cut-out ornaments to readers, and sharing thrifty Christmas tree decor idea. Rather than burn the envelopes that Christmas cards come in, use the envelope to create tree decorations.





A History of the Borg-Warner Transmissions

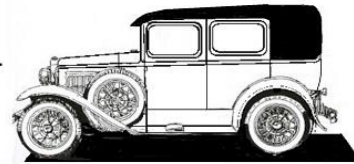


I started the year in the Model A Garage with an article about adapting a Borg-Warner Transition. I am ending the year with the history of the Borg-Warner transmission and the role that it has played in launching the Motor City's high-performance movement of the sixties and through time, now.

When the Borg-Warner T-10 was introduced in 1957, four-speed transmissions were hardly an innovation. They were nearly as old as the auto industry, and in the 1950s all proper sports cars had to have one. Corvette engineer Zora Arkus-Dontov was keenly aware of that fact, saddled as he was with the Chevy three-speed manual box.

Considered good enough for American cars and drivers, three-speeds were universal equipment on the Detroit passenger cars of the '50s, and there were no four-speed gearboxes suitable for performance applications in the General Motors supply chain. Working with GM engineering, Borg-Warner of Muncie, Indiana stepped up with the T-10 four-speed transmission, which became available on the Corvette on May 1, 1957.

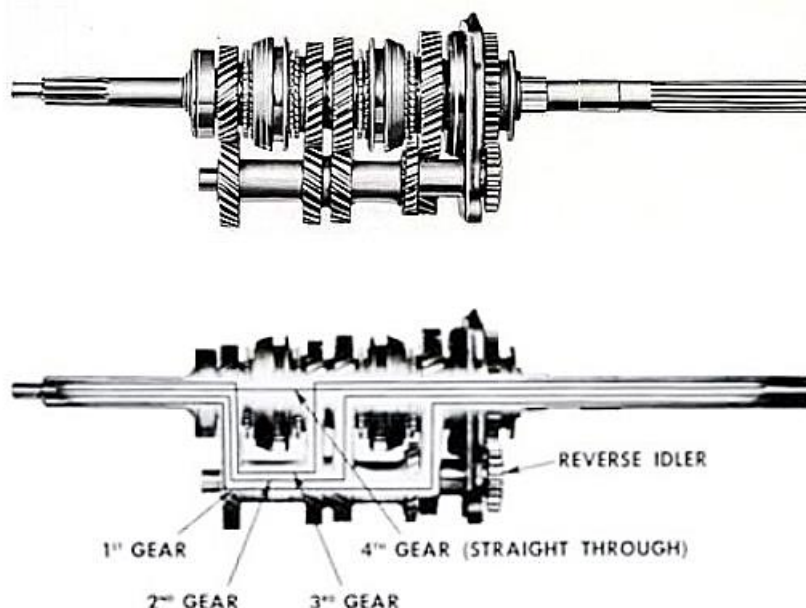

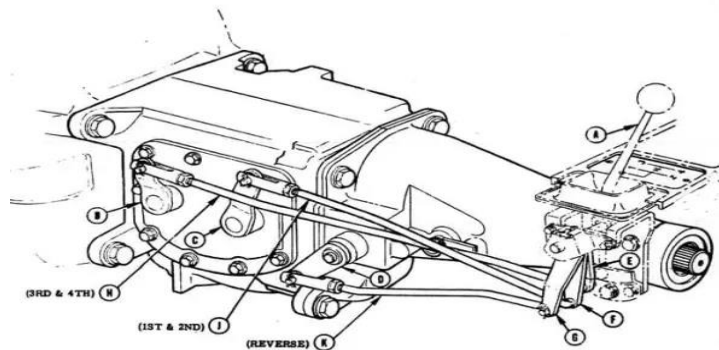
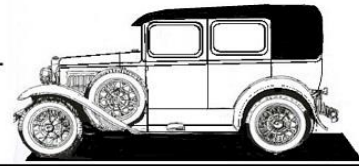
The T-10 was actually a clever adaptation of Borg-Warner's T-85 three-speed manual transmission. The reverse gear and idler were moved out of the main housing and relocated in the extension or tail shaft housing, and a direct fourth gear was located where reverse had been (above). All four forward speeds were synchronized, and the package fit neatly in the same physical space as a standard three-speed.

In the initial '57 Corvette application, the closely spaced gear ratios were: 2.20:1 (first), 1.66:1 (second), 1.31 (third), 1.00:1 (fourth) but over the T-10's long production life, a number of close and wide-ratio gear sets were produced



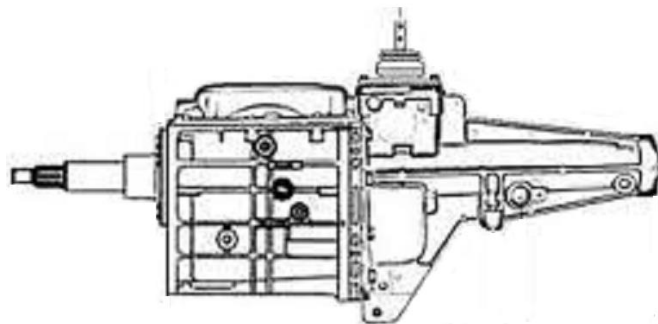
This three-speed / four-speed adaptation had actually been conceived and patented by General Motors years earlier, but Borg-Warner a veteran transmission supplier, won the production contract. In Motor City there was an explosion of demand for four-speed transmissions in the performance-car market.

Corvette had the exclusive on the four-speed until 1959, when it became an option on Chevrolet and Pontiac passenger cars as well. Ford made the T-10 available in the summer of '61, over the counter at first, while Studebaker offered it on the 1961 Hawk. For 1963, Chrysler jumped on T-10 bandwagon, followed by American Motors in 1966. The Borg-Warner four-speed was now offered on performance cars across the U.S. market. It was an essential component in the '60s muscle car movement.



GM, Ford, and Chrysler all developed their own four-speed gearboxes in due time, but an updated version of the B-W four-speed called the Super T-10 was used in GM performance applications through the early 1980s. While the four-speed manual was eventually eclipsed by five and six-speed gearboxes in production vehicles, in the hot rodding and classic muscle car worlds the T-10 never went away.

The T-5 was originally designed by BorgWarner based on the T-4 and earlier SR4, and was sold as the BorgWarner T-5 until the design was sold to TTC (aka Tremec) in the late 1990s. The SR4 was a light-duty 4-speed manual that used ball and needle bearings on the countershaft with bronze synchronizer rings. The T4 improved this design with tapered roller bearings on the input and output shafts and a straight roller bearing on the counter gear. The T-5 is a T4 with an added overdrive gear. The T-5 carries a part number of 1352-000-xxx, where xxx is a three-digit application-specific number ranging from 001 to 260 that also can be used to distinguish World Class from Standard T-5 transmissions.



The first T-5s were installed in the AMC Spirit/Concord. In 1982, GM began fitting the T-5 to the S-10/S-15 compact pickup trucks; then in 1983, both Ford (Mustang) and GM (Camaro/Firebird) picked up the T-5 for their production muscle cars.

The T-5 has become a popular resto-mod option for older and classic manual transmission cars, as the overdrive gear can improve fuel economy. In general, retrofitting the T-5 is straightforward for many rear-drive Fords from the Model A, through the 1960s and 1970s, as they are dimensionally compatible.

When I looked at this month's food and beverages, there is only one item that stuck out to me, Egg Nog. I give you a simple recipe from tastebetterfromscratch.com.

Ingredients

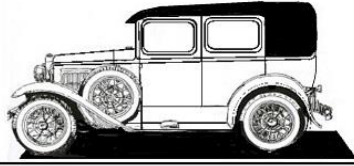
6 large egg yolks
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 cup heavy whipping cream
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
pinch of salt
1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
ground cinnamon , for topping
alcohol optional

Instructions

1. Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together in a medium bowl until light and creamy.
2. In a saucepan over medium-high heat, combine the cream, milk, nutmeg and salt. Stir often until mixture reaches a bare simmer.
3. Add a big spoonful of the hot milk to the egg mixture, whisking vigorously. Repeat, adding a big spoonful at a time, to temper the eggs.
4. Once most of the hot milk has been added to the eggs, pour the mixture back into the saucepan on the stove.
5. Whisk constantly for just a few minutes, until the mixture is just slightly thickened (or until it reaches about 160 degrees F on a thermometer). It will thicken more as it cools.
6. Remove from heat and stir in the vanilla, and alcohol*, if using.
7. Pour the eggnog through a fine mesh strainer into a pitcher or other container and cover with plastic wrap.
8. Refrigerate until chilled. It will thicken as it cools. If you want a thinner, completely smooth consistency, you can add the entire mixture to a blender with 1 or 2 tablespoons of milk and blend until smooth.
9. Serve with a sprinkle of cinnamon or nutmeg, and fresh whipped cream, if desired.
10. Store homemade eggnog in the fridge for up to one week.

I recommend doubling the recipes, because it only makes about 4 cups. You can use this as a creamer for your coffee, and breakfast or desert drink or a cocktail. If you want to add alcohol to your eggnog, start with ¼ cup brandy, bourbon, rum or whisky added at the same time as the vanilla, or after cooling the eggnog. Add more to taste, if desired. If you like cinnamon you can use Fire Ball, Sin Fire or Yukon Jack Fire. If you like peppermint, you can use peppermint schnapps or Yukon Jack Perma Frost.

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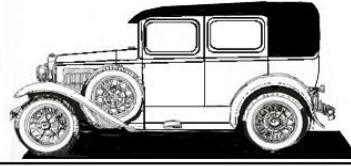
