This Month in History

June 1928 – 1931

1928

1st - The crew of the *Southern Cross* landed at Wheeler Field in Hawaii after 27 hours 28 minutes in the first leg of their trans-Pacific flight.

3rd - The Southern Cross took off from Barking Sands, Hawaii, at dawn, heading for Fiji.

4th - The *Southern Cross* landed in Suva, Fiji, after 34 hours 33 minutes in the air.


8th - The *Southern Cross* took off from Fiji on the final leg of the trans-Pacific flight to Australia.

9th - The *Southern Cross* landed at Brisbane, Australia at 10:10 a.m., completing the trans-Pacific flight after 7,300 miles and 83 hours 21 minutes in the air.

10th - The *Southern Cross* flew to Sydney.

June 1928 - 1931

1928 - A very active end of the month in Politics ...



12th - The Republican National Convention opened in Kansas City, Missouri. Herbert Hoover (above left) was expected to win the presidential nomination easily, so most of the speculation was about who would be chosen as his running mate.

14th - U.S. Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover was unanimously chosen as the Republican nominee for President of the United States.

15th - Charles Curtis (above center left) of Kansas was named Herbert Hoover's running mate on the final day of the Republican Convention.


26th - The Democratic National Convention opened in Houston, Texas. There was little doubt that Al Smith (above center right) and Joseph T. Robinson (above right) would be nominated for the presidential ticket, so most speculation was about what policy the party would adopt on the matter of Prohibition. Governor Smith remained in Albany and did not attend the convention himself.

27th - New York Governor Al Smith was formally nominated as a Democratic candidate at the National Convention. "Because of his power of leadership there is no doubt the governor will make an efficient president, a great president", Franklin D. Roosevelt said in the nomination address. "He again will place us among the nations of the world as a country which values its ideals as much as its material prosperity."

28th - Al Smith accepted the nomination for President of the United States at the Democratic National Convention,^[51] becoming the first Roman Catholic person in the U.S. to be nominated for president by a major political party.

29th - Arkansas U.S. Senator Joseph T. Robinson was nominated for vice president on the final day of the Democratic National Convention.


9th - The Chicago Board of Trade Building, the city's tallest, opens. (below left)



28th - The Terminal Tower in Cleveland opened. Terminal Tower is a 52-story, 771 feet, landmark skyscraper located on Public Square in Downtown Cleveland, Ohio, United States. Built during the skyscraper boom of the 1920s and 1930s, it was the second-tallest building in the world when it was completed. (above right)

1931

23rd - Wiley Post and Harold Gatty took off in the Lockheed Vega Winnie Mae from Roosevelt Field in an attempt to fly around the world in record time. Post and Gatty were successful in circumnavigating the world in 8 days, 15 hours and 15 minutes and returned to Long Island on July 1. This is the same plane that Amelia Earhart flew, becoming the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean.

25th 1928

The silent film The Red Dance premiered at the Globe Theatre in New York City. It was preceded by the debut of the Newsreel Shaw Talks for Movietone News, in which American audiences got their first opportunity to hear the voice of George Bernard Shaw. The Irish playwright displayed some of his signature wit as he jovially addressed his imaginary audience and performed a visual impression of Benito Mussolini.

The war film The Four Feathers, starring William Powell (below left) and Fay Wray (below right), premiered at the Criterion Theater in New York City.

Gallant Fox won the Belmont Stakes horse race to win the American Triple Crown of Thoroughbred Racing.









From Brian Laine and the Laine Family Website ... Model-A Carburetor Upgrade

The stock Model-A carburetor is a very simple one-barrel updraft carburetor. No accelerator pump, not a lot of circuits and adjustments, but it works surprisingly well in practice. It even has a nifty control in the cockpit that allows you to pull a knob for the choke, and twist it for mixture. And this control can be easily disconnected at the carburetor with the sliding of a sleeve. The carb fills from gravity since the fuel tank is behind the dash, and the carb is mounted down on the side of the motor. Looks like this:



The real problem is that it gets terrible gas mileage. Around 13-15 MPG. Pretty poor for a 2,200 lb car. I had read that you can improve mileage and power by installing a more modern carburetor, the Weber DGV. This is a two-barrel, progressive-linkage carb with accelerator pump, and all the circuits that make modern carbs work well in a variety of conditions. And I happened to have one of these carburetors sitting around from when I converted my Austin Healey Bugeye Sprite from the Weber back to SUs.

Typically Model-A Weber conversion kits are available as a complete package, but since I had the Weber already, I could only find one place selling the manifold and linkage kit separately. It's *Auto Care and Restoration* in Redding California (<u>www.partsformodelafords.com</u>). Nice people, but it took about a month for the order to be filled. Then later I found that they hadn't shipped part of the linkage, so had to wait for that too.

Model-A Carburetor Upgrade

Since this is a downdraft installation, the carburetor is mounted quite a bit higher on the engine. Enough so that it's a concern whether gravity feed is adequate since the static-head is much lower. I understand some people do run these on gravity, but most install an electric fuel pump. While that's probably the best way to do it, I decided that since my Model-B motor had the boss for a mechanical fuel pump, I'd use one of those to be more in keeping with the vintage nature of the car. The person I bought my car from set me up with a box of random Model-B fuel pump parts. Since I didn't like the looks of the lever arm on any of them, I decided to send one off to *Renner's Corner* in Manchester Michigan (www.rennerscorner.com) for a rebuild. I got a call back that this wasn't a Model-B pump, it was from some sort of industrial engine. I thought it was sort of unusual that the mounting pattern looked the same, but learned that there was an ANSI standard for fuel pump mounting that applies to the flange (but not the lever). Great idea, wish there were more common parts. That probably explains why a small-block-Chevy fuel pump block-off plate fits the small-block-Ford engine that I'm building for my 240Z.

I sent the other complete pump, and the body that I had remaining, off the Renner's Corner. Turns out the complete pump wasn't for a Model-B either, but the body was. By the time I purchased the parts from Mr. Renner to make the pump complete, and added the cost for the two shipments of core parts to him, it would have been cheaper, and a lot faster, to just buy a complete fuel pump without any core. Well, live and learn.

The Weber has a modern, chrome air filter assembly that isn't all in keeping with the Model-A engine's appearance. I bought a small old oil-bath filter at a swap meet, hoping that it could be modified to work, but the carburetor is so close to the hood on the side, it wouldn't fit without being mounted way off center. I found an aluminum carburetor inlet at *Pierce Manifolds* (www.piercemanifolds.com). It's intended to be used with a hose for a remote inlet, but looks pretty vintage used stand-alone. Especially after I painted the intake manifold and air-inlet with good old Ford engine green like the rest of the motor.

The fuel line is 1/4" OD, which doesn't deliver a lot of fuel (3/16" ID?), but evidently it's enough. The fuel bowel and fuel pump use special compression fittings. They are available at NAPA or CarQuest as "Ford Fittings." I also got a choke cable at NAPA and ran it up to where the choke tube was mounted originally. I had to make a little aluminum spacer at the top to extend it out a little from the bracket.



I took this opportunity to mount the "heater" that I got with the car, but was just in a box of parts rather than mounted. It was missing a couple of parts that I fabricated. This was a period accessory since the standard Model-A had no heater. You can see it as the large aluminum duct directly behind the carburetor. It works by routing air, pushed by the fan, through the ducting which encompasses the hot exhaust manifold, then sends it through a hole in the fire-wall that can be easily opened and closed. From inside the car, it looks like this...



The heater works amazingly well, although I suppose it's sending some carbon monoxide into the cabin if the exhaust manifold is leaking at all.

I haven't actually driven the car with the Weber yet, I'm still waiting for the last part of throttle linkage that they are sending me.

Update: After three weeks of waiting for the throttle linkage part, I gave up and found something that could be modified to work from a Volvo at Pull-A-Part. I've driven the car now, and it seems snappier with the Weber. Fires right up like it can't wait to run. I'm happy with the conversion.

Epilog - it's many months later now, and I never did get the linkage parts, but don't need them anymore, anyway. After driving it for a while, I discovered that it didn't turn into a Toyota Prius when it comes to economy. Just a little better than stock now.



In honor of June 9, National Strawberry-Rhubarb Pie day, here is a recipe from the New York Times.



INGREDIENTS:

For the Filling
2 cups rhubarb in one-inch pieces, about one pound
3 cups strawberry halves
1 cup sugar
3 tablespoons "minute" tapioca
3 tablespoons unsalted butter
For the Crust
2½ cups all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
½ teaspoon sugar, plus extra for sprinkling
15 tablespoons unsalted butter, very cold and cut into ¼-inch cubes
½ cup ice-cold water
1 tablespoons milk

PREPARATION

Step 1 - Prepare the pastry: combine the flour, salt and sugar in a large mixing bowl. Using a fork or pastry cutter, work half of the butter into the flour until it resembles coarse meal. Quickly work the remaining butter into the dough until the biggest pieces are the size of lima beans. Drizzle in the water in several additions, tossing and mixing between each. (It should look rather ropy and rough.) Stop adding water when a few bits of dry flour remain in the bottom of the bowl; do not overwork the dough or it will become tough. Gather two-thirds of the dough and wrap tightly with plastic wrap. Do the same with the remaining third. Flatten into disks. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. When the dough is chilled, roll out the larger piece and line a nine-inch pie pan.

Step 2 - If rhubarb is thick, peel it. Combine rhubarb and strawberries in a bowl. Mix sugar and tapioca together and fold gently into the strawberries and rhubarb. Allow to macerate for 15 minutes.

Step 3 - Preheat oven to 425.

Step 4 - Spoon fruit into pastry shell and dot with butter. Roll out remaining pastry, cut into strips three-quarters of an inch wide and weave a lattice to cover the pie. You can simply lay the strips on top in criss-cross fashion if weaving is not one of your skills. Seal, trim and crimp the edges. Brush the lattice with milk and sprinkle with a bit of sugar.

Step 5 - Bake in preheated oven for 15 minutes. Lower heat to 350 degrees and bake 40 minutes longer, until pastry has browned and filling begins to bubble. Let pie cool completely before serving, at least 3 hours and up to overnight to set the filling.




