This Month in History May 1928 - 1931

May 1st – Observed as May Day, a holiday and spring festival since ancient times, also observed in socialist countries as a workers' holiday or Labor Day

May 1, 1931



The Empire State Building, the tallest building in the world, opened in New York City. At 11:30 a.m.

President Hoover pressed a button in the White House that turned on the lights of all 102 stories.

May 2, 1928

In recognition of their accomplishment of the first non-stop transatlantic airplane flight from east to west three weeks earlier, U.S. President Calvin Coolidge presented the nation's Distinguished Flying Cross to pilots Hermann Köhl and Ehrenfried Günther Freiherr von Hünefeld of Germany and James Fitzmaurice of Ireland. The men were the first foreign citizens to receive the Cross, based on an amendment to the terms of the award approved the day before by the U.S. Congress.

May 3, 1928

The town of Carnation, Washington, changed its name back to Tolt. The official name would remain until 1951, when the name would be changed to Carnation again.



This Month in History May 1928 - 1931

May 16, 1928

A panic on Wall Street caused stocks to plunge by as many as forty points, as a record 4,820,840 shares changed hands. The fall was triggered by selling of shares in aircraft companies

May 22, 1928

The Capper-Ketcham Act for promotion of educating American youth in agricultural techniques, was passed into law in the United States. Sponsored by U.S. Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas and Congressman John C. Ketcham of Michigan, the act financed the founding of the Future Farmers of America and provided matching funds for states with 4-H clubs.







May 24, 1931

The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad (B&O) introduced the first completely air-conditioned passenger train, the *Columbian*, running between Washington and New York.

May 27, 1930



The Chrysler Building in New York City opened to the public. It was the new tallest building in the world at the time, but it only held the title for a year before the Empire State Building was completed.

May 29, 1928

Automobile manufacturers Dodge and Chrysler announced a merger worth \$235 million.

May 31, 1929

The Ford Motor Company signed a nine-year contract with the Soviet Union. The Soviets agreed to purchase \$30 million worth of Ford products within four years while Ford agreed to provide technical advice and help build an automobile factory in Nizhny Novgorod. [43] The Nizhegorodsky Avtomobilny Zavod factory would open at the end of 1931 and produce its first vehicle, based on the Ford Model A, and marketed in the USSR as the NAZ-A starting on January 1, 1932.





A test screening was held for the animated short film *Plane Crazy*, featuring the first appearance of Mickey Mouse.

May 17, 1928

The 1928 Summer Olympics opened in Amsterdam in the Netherlands with competition in field hockey more than two months before the main events of the games. This is a first for the Olympics.





May 21, 1928



The part-silent, part-sound drama film *The Lion and the Mouse* was released, marking the first time Lionel Barrymore spoke from the screen.

May 26, 1928

Jantzen Beach Amusement Park opened on Hayden Island in Portland, Oregon. The popular amusement park was open from 1928 to 1970 in the middle of the Columbia River. "The Coney Island of the West" opened on May 26, 1928 as the largest amusement park in the nation, covering over 123 acres at the northern tip of Portland. On opening day, 15,000 people paid the \$0.10 admission. The following day, 25,000 people came out to the park. The amusement park included a merry-go-round, fun house, Big Dipper roller coaster, Golden Canopy Ballroom, four swimming pools, a natatorium, 25 acres of picnic grounds, and 15 acres of parking. It surpassed all attendance expectations; over 30 million people patronized the park through its 42 years.

The musical comedy film *The Cocoanuts*, starring the Marx Brothers in their first feature-length movie, was released.



May 4, 1929

The comedy duo of Laurel and Hardy made the jump to talking films with the release of *Unaccustomed As We Are*. Stan Laurel's famous whimper of panic was heard for the first time, as was Oliver Hardy's catchphrase, "Why don't you do something to help me!"

May 16, 1929

The first Academy Awards ceremony was held in the ballroom of the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel in Los Angeles, with a private dinner for 270 guests, followed by the distribution of the 12 awards. It is the only Academy Awards ceremony not broadcast on either radio or television. Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (AMPAS) president Douglas Fairbanks was the host and German film star Emil Jannings was given the very first award, by Academy director Douglas Fairbanks for Best Actor. Janet Gaynor won for Best Actress and *Wings* won the first-ever Award for Outstanding Picture.








Other awards included; Best Directing (Comedy Picture) Lewis Milestone – *Two Arabian Knights*, Best Directing (Dramatic Picture) - Frank Borzage – *7th Heaven*, Best Unique and Artistic Picture *Sunrise* – Fox, Best Writing (Original Story) *Underworld* – Ben Hecht, Best Writing (Adaptation) *7th Heaven* – Benjamin Glazer, Best Art Direction *The Dove* and *Tempest* both by William Cameron Menzies, Best Cinematography *Sunrise* – Charles Rosher and Karl Struss, Best Engineering Effects *Wings* – Roy Pomeroy, and Best Writing (Title Writing) Joseph Farnham.

The Model A Horn

Non-working or weak Model A horns seem to keep rearing their ugly heads. Every couple of months, I hear about someone who has this affliction. So, let us go over a few things and see if we can eliminate some of the problems.


The first thing to remember is that unlike modern horns, the Model A horn requires a lot more current flow. Anything that would hinder this "flow" should be addressed. Bad wiring, bad or multiple connections, and inadequate wire size are all current robbing and should be corrected. Check the horn button to see that it is working properly. And, don't forget to check connections all the way back to the battery. Cleaning the commutator should be done on a semi-regular schedule. The commutator is the bronze segmented ring around the motor shaft that the spring loaded brushes "ride" on. Bronze does corrode, especially in humid climates. Keeping these clean will improve conductivity. Some people use fine sand paper while others use a wire brush. Both are affective at removing corrosion. If you use sandpaper, try to stay with the extra fine grit and be sure to clean away any sand that might be left behind. If a small wire brush is your weapon of choice, then be careful to stay away from the brushes and other wire connections as you may cause sparking. Make sure when you finish, to look for and remove any stray wire bristles left behind by the wire brush. Whichever method you use, the commutator should shine like a new penny. You may also want to clean between the commutator bars to remove any "brush" residue, which can build up and cause "arcing" between the bars. Use a toothpick, but be gentle, you do not want to remove the material that holds the bars in place. Cleaning the brushes is not usually necessary, using the horn will keep them clean, but if you feel it needs to be done, I would seek out a person that is proficient in taking them apart. Replacing then is usually done more often than cleaning them.





Model A Garage

Since the A horn is a machine, lubrication is very important. The places needing oil are on the shaft, both sides of the motor. I usually dribble some high-grade oil where the motor shaft touches the adjusting arm and where the motor shaft disappears into the "bell" of the horn. Both places should have a felt washer. These act as a reservoir to store oil. If one or both are missing, then you need to oil a lot more often! The shaft needs to be kept lubricated.



For the horn you just need a couple drops of oil on the felt pad. The felt pad is in the back.

Make sure the adjusting screw is not too tight. The tighter it is, the more it sound your horn will make, but too tight will require the motor to work harder than necessary - gobbling current and creating excessive heat that could cause motor damage.



Even if these things are all done, some horns will still not operate well. The charging system may need to be "kicking" to operate your horn. (This could be a sign of bad windings on the armature of the motor.) Most charging systems will not charge at an idle – no generator will and only a few alternators can. If you need a little "rev" on the engine to make your horn bellow, then perhaps a rebuild is in order. There may be other reasons that your horn will not work or be weak, but these are the most common. If you've tried these solutions and are still not able to tell people to "git outta the way", then I would look into a horn rebuild. Most parts are not very expensive. You will be surprised at how easily your A could have its voice back.

Recipe of the Month

In honor of May 5th and the top 10 Authentic Cinco de Mayo Foods and Fun Facts...

- 1. Molé Molé Poblano is the official dish of Cinco de Mayo because the day commemorates Mexico's victory over the French at the Battle of Puebla. Try our take on molé with our Molé Tilapia Tostadas recipe!



May is an exciting month for all of our youth connected to the Model A hobby. As outlined in The Restorer's January/February article titled: May is Model A Youth Month, written by Emily Ellway, the Model A community sets aside the entire month, worldwide, for the recognition of the young people involved with the Model A hobby and is dedicated to activities designed to engage our youth into our hobby. According to the Annie Casey Foundation and U.S. census data: 12% of the U.S. population, or approximately 30 million people are between the ages of 18 – 24. Think of this wonderful resource as our future and we need to engage them now to help set their future in our hobby.

Emily states in her article: "The Goal of the Model A Youth Month" is for each local Model A club to host an event that exposes as many youth and young adults as possible the Model A Ford." A great way to get them engaged is to host events that let them touch and feel the car. I've noticed a marked increase in interest when I let young people honk the horn, sit behind the steering wheel, stand on the running board or rumble seat or let them sit in the back seat. Their eyes always open wide and a big grin spreads across their face when they honk the horn. Nothing like that Ahooga - Ahooga sound to get their interest. Not only does it warm their heart, it warms mine as well.

As Emily points out, "Generally, activities that are hands-on or up-close are the best for encouraging participation and generating questions. But whatever you choose takes us one step further in fostering involvement and creating interest." Just remember, you just can't go wrong regardless of the activities your club hosts. Your own enthusiasm for the Model A is contagious and the kids or young adults will respond in kind.

Another resource for youth involvement ideas is the March/April 2023 Restorer article by Dr. Wilber Smith about the Pasadena High School Model A Club's "third" Model A car raffle. Here is a group of kids after my own heart. They are total immersed in all aspects of the Model A operation and restoration.
