


Someone asked if the Food Bank takes pet food. They do accept cat and dog food!! So feel free to add that to our collection!!

## The March Modern Iron Tour

We had a wonderful turn out for our March tour to the Columbia Gorge Museum in Stevenson, WA. Can you believe that for the third month in a row there were no Model A's? Bill & MJ did drive their 1952 Chevy pickup. Our turn out had 29 people participating, they were: Lynn & Patty, Leonard & Linda, Bob & Carma, Don & Dee, Corley & Nancy, Bob & Sherry, Jerry & Dian, Mike & Becky, Jack & Lynn, Jack & Pat, Deon & Diane & AK, Fred Holm, Bill & MJ, Rich & Joanne, and Ginny Bay.

Arriving at the museum right on time we were given our private demonstration of the 1879 McCord fish wheel which was used to harvest salmon from the Columbia River in 1879 until 1934. We were also given a demonstration of The Corliss engine that drove saws, saw carriages and conveyers at the Stevenson saw mill. It was in operation from 1907 to 1941. There was a rare 1917 Curtiss JN-4 bi-plane hanging from the ceiling and perched over a 1921 Mack AC log truck. Upstairs there was the world's largest collection of Rosaries. Our group photo was taken in front of the Museum's 1929 Ford Model A coupe.

# Technical Notes Brake Lining Cleaning

I was asked by a person if one could use a wire brush on an angle grinder or a roloc tool attachment to remove the glazing and dirt from brake linings on the Model A. They were referring to the woven linings.

The answer is no! These would be dangerous and could cause serious damage to the linings. Those tools are much too aggressive to be used on the woven linings. I have found that using a soft bristle brass wire brush by hand works very well. Clean up and down then side to side, and then tap the shoe against something hard to remove the dirt. If you choose to use compressed air, do it outside with low pressure (10 psi) wearing eye protection and a respirator.

NAPA Auto Parts sells a tire cleaning brush that works extremely well for cleaning the linings. (Fig. 1)
