

Thank you, Linda, for the progressive lunch tour - you and Roger make a great team! The backroads tour was beautiful and the food awesome.


Just a reminder of the 2017 community service projects we selected:



Technical Notes

Making a Diagnostic Ground Point Under the Hood

The Model A often requires diagnosis of the ignition circuits or electrical systems under the hood. To help locate problems a test light is often used to test for the presence of voltage in circuits. These are usually a tool with a light bulb, a wire to an alligator clip for ground and a sharp pointed probe. Figure 1 shows two common styles of these tools. They work on 6, 8 or 12-volt circuits. They are connected between a powered circuit and ground; if voltage is present the light will shine. I made a modification to my Model A so that I have a diagnostic ground point under the hood. To do this I removed the inside firewall speedometer cable clip screw (Fig2) and replaced it with a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch longer stainless-steel screw. As a note, you can see that I replaced the original speedo clip with a modern rubber coated clip to reduce the rattle noise. Test to be sure the screw is well grounded. The paint might need to be scrapped to obtain a good ground. The stainless-steel screw will not rust or corrode. It will protrude into the engine compartment by $\frac{1}{2}$ inch (Fig3). Being stainless it will be bright and contrast from the black firewall. This now provides a good positioned ground point to attach the alligator clip (Fig4) of the test light.

A rubber vacuum cap (Fig5) can be placed on the protruding screw. These come in many different colors. I used gray just for the photo so it could easily be seen. I use black in real life so it will blend in with the firewall. They also provide protection from scratching your hand if bumped by accident.

Glen Smith's Custom Ford Touring Wins 1931 Muroc Dry Lake Race

Los Angeles County, California has long been a breeding ground for racing, hot rodding, custom car building, and the manufacture of racing and speed equipment. In the early-1930s during the Great Depression, most area competition events were held on circle tracks and 125-miles away at the Muroc Dry Lake, both were testing grounds for racing cars and speed parts built in the region.

Today's feature images are of 16-year old Glen Smith and his Ford special which won the Gilmore Oil Co. Trophy for the Main Event at the June 14, 1931, Roadster Races held on the Muroc Dry Lake. Glen and his father Boyd Smith, who owned a salvage yard in San Fernando constructed the car using a modified Model "T" Ford chassis fitted with a Model "A" Ford engine and transmission mated to a "T" rear axle.


2017 MAFCA National Tour- September 24-29
