

Henry Ford's Search for a Bumper Crop

A car "grown" on the farm was the late Henry Ford's dream in the early 1930's. So he researched and tested thousands of vegetables from cabbages and carrots to cornstalks and onions determined to discover a crop that could be converted to car components.

When he finally hit upon his bumper crop, the simple plant that would grow into an entire plastics industry, it amounted to only a hill of beans soybeans.

Henry Ford planted 8,000 acres of his magical crop and opened a facility at the Rouge complex in 1940 to extract oil from the bonanza beans for automotive enamel paint. The soybean meal residue was processed and experimentally molded into horn buttons, gearshift and instrument knobs, window trim strips, distributor cases, accelerator pedals and paint.

The blend of farm and factory was underway and plastics technology was launched.

Though plastic car body parts proved impractical and expensive to manufacture in the early '40's, the experimental plastic deck lid of Mr Ford's own 1941 sedan was a model of resilience. He delighted in whacking the lid with an axe (see photo) to demonstrate its ability to withstand such abuse without a dent or scratch.

Today, because of the need for lighter, more rust-resistant and fuel-efficient cars, use of plastic parts is snowballing. By 1985, Ford Motor Company expects to use well over one billion pounds of plastic materials annually in its cars and trucks.



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
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<u>1930 Ford Super-Service Stations</u>



In an effort to capture a larger market share in 1935 the Ford Motor Company was promoting "Ford Super Service Stations" which were service garages that also sold gasoline, parts, accessories and new cars. The concept was not a new one as the Automaker sold franchises for similar operations as early as 1914. In 1931 the "Ford News," a Ford Motor Company dealers publication reported about a Ford dealer that operated a "Super Service Station" which may have been the beginning of a sales campaign to promote a new name for the facilities.
