

Tiny Tips

STEERING GEAR LUBRICATION

As a suggestion, the next time you service your steering gear, fill the box with as much Patent Cures chassis lube as you can pump into it. Then fill in the voids with all the EP-140 gear lubricant that it will hold. Then turn the steering gear from stop to stop and then add EP-140 to the top once again. You see, all steering gears are prone to leak



with normal use. By using chassis lube you will provide a non-leaking medium that will tend to seal the leakage area while the EP-

140 will provide the extreme pressure lubrication for severe metal to metal lubrication.

In other words, the grease will keep the lubricating oil on the job.



John & Dianne Earnest 1929 Woody Wagon

In 1994 we met Al Hollan, from Mica, Washington, who showed is his Woodie wagon and explained he had parts for another one, which he was selling. In the fall 1998, I called him back to see if it was still for sale. In May, 1999, Art Pugsley and Al Hollan brought "most" of the parts including the hacked down pickup version shown in the before picture.

Some beautiful wood already cut and ready for fitting and finishing came with the package.

The wood pattern in this Woodie is particularly beautiful as it is cut from one piece of wood and the grains match all the way across the sides. I had enough original parts that I decided to try to use all original parts in the restoration process.

With the help of many people, the Woodie was slowly coming tighter. It was a fun hobby. Then when I discovered the National Meet was coming to Portland in 2004, the hobby became more of a job as I tried to finish in time for the meet, logging over 1700 hours of time spent on the project. After false starts with a mouse nest in the gas tank, broken carburetor, and clogged filters, the Woodie made it to the 2004 National Model A meet in Portland!

After being judged (against a standard based on what a new Model A Ford Woodie would be like coming off the showroom floor) it won 416 points, which awarded it the highly coveted AWARD OF EXCELLENCE!

It feels so good and I am very proud to belong to our club that is so generous in our community service activities. I look forward to our January planning meeting, I can't wait to see what new adventures await us.



Jim's Tech Tip

Towing Your Model A on a Trailer



There will be times when you need to transport your Model A on a trailer. Here's a tip on trailer loading to help you tow safely.

When the car is loaded on the trailer, the tongue weight of the trailer on the trailer hitch (on the back of your car or truck) should be between 10-15% of the total weight of the combined



"trailer+Model A". If you load the trailer with less than 10% of the weight on the hitch, the trailer will sway as the speed increases, which is very dangerous. Over 15% can put too much unnecessary load on the back of your tow vehicle, which can take weight off of your front wheels and backing a which is also not good.

(needed for steering and braking) – which is also not good.

How do you know the weight of your "trailer+Model A"? I took my car on the trailer to my local feed store where they have a scale. Many truck stops also have scales. I parked the loaded trailer on the scale, disconnected my truck, and moved the truck off the scale. They charge a small fee to give you the weight. Once I had that total weight, it was easy to calculate 10% and 15% of that. For example, if your "trailer+Model A" is 4,200 pounds, your Target Tongue Weight is 420 to 630 pounds, call it 525.

Once you know the Target Tongue Weight that you are shooting for, how do you know what the actual tongue weight is when you put the Model A on the trailer? You can figure it out with a ruler or tape measure.

Go to a building supply store (like Home Depot) with your tow vehicle and no trailer. Measure and record the distance between the bottom of the trailer hitch and the ground. Now start loading 80# bags of dry concrete mix into your car trunk or truck bed until you have loaded your Target Tongue Weight. (I had a helpful young guy at HD load them in for me.) The exact load is not critical, but it must be above your 10% number. Now measure and record the distance between the bottom of the trailer hitch and the ground again. Once you have those 2 numbers, you can ask the helpful lad at the store to unload all those bags and put them back! Thankfully, you only have to do this exercise one time.

With these 2 measurements, before and after the load was added, you can quickly figure out the change in height above the ground when you have your Target Tongue Weight on the back of your tow vehicle. This CHANGE in the height of your trailer hitch is the HITCH DROP that you need to get when you load your Model A on the trailer.

Before attaching the trailer to your tow vehicle in the future, measure the height of the trailer hitch above the ground. Now attach the trailer and load your Model A on it. Pull the Model A forward on the trailer until your trailer hitch has dropped by your Target Hitch Drop. You can roll the Model A forward and backward a bit on the trailer to get the amount of drop that you are shooting for. Now tie the Model A down in this position on the trailer and be confident that you have enough, but not too much, tongue weight on your trailer hitch.

I have marked on my trailer the best spot to load a Model A to get the target tongue weight and hitch drop. When I put them on the mark, the tongue weight is correct.



Vintage Gas: Grand Opening of Salt Lake City Firestone Service Store



Updated-During the late-1920s and the 1930s, the Firestone, Goodyear and BF Goodrich tire companies in an effort to cash in on the automobile service market opened service centers that not only sold tires but also offered car and truck service. The grand opening celebration of this new and modern *Firestone Service Store* located in the greater Salt Lake City, Utah area was held on Friday and Saturday, August 24th and 25th, 1934.

A couple of things of note in the image are the fuel pumps and the car on display on the far-left of the photo. The gas pumps are deluxe "merchandising" units with the bottom section enclosed in glass for the display automotive parts and sundries. Reader Robert Rampton has identified the automobile inside of the gathering of men on the left as *AB Jenkins' 1932 Pierce-Arrow roadster* he used for his first 24-hour record attempt on the Bonneville Salt Flats. Jenkins lived in Salt Lake City and Firestone was one of his sponsors so it appears he brought the Pierce out to help promote the Grand Opening.


