Structural Details of Ford Bodies



How Ford Bodies Are Made

Beauty of design is combined with strength and safety in the New Ford bodies.

All structural material in Ford bodies is steel, wood being used only for attaching the trimming.

Pillars are unusually narrow to permit unobstructed vision. Lower rear panels, including the wheel housing, are made in one piece for additional strength. Many parts are electrically welded to give greater strength and rigidity.

Panels and frame sections are welded or riveted together wherever there is a possibility of the body weaving, thus eliminating all chance of metallic squeaks of this nature. In the large units where bolts are necessary, strips of anti-squeak material are used between the sections. Before the interior is trimmed sound-deadening material is used in all places where noises might develop. Soft roof construction of padding over a galvanized wire mesh insures absolute quietness.

Bunch's Wondrous Junkyard



By Michael Lamm. I've always had a soft spot for automotive junkyards. And yes, I know I'm not supposed to call them that, but I use the word with great respect and fondness. I never, met a junkyard I didn't like, in fact, I even worked in one for a short time. But that's another story.

When my family moved to Northern California in the mid-1960's, I discovered all sorts of vintage junkyards in the area, each one chocked full of marvelous old cars. One of my favorites was Bunch's, an archeological wonder on the outskirts of the little Central Valley town of Escalon.

Model A Ford coupe was one among many elderly Fords in Bunch's junkyard. Cars rusted very slowly, if at all, in the Central Valley's dry climate. Surface rust was mostly due to dew.

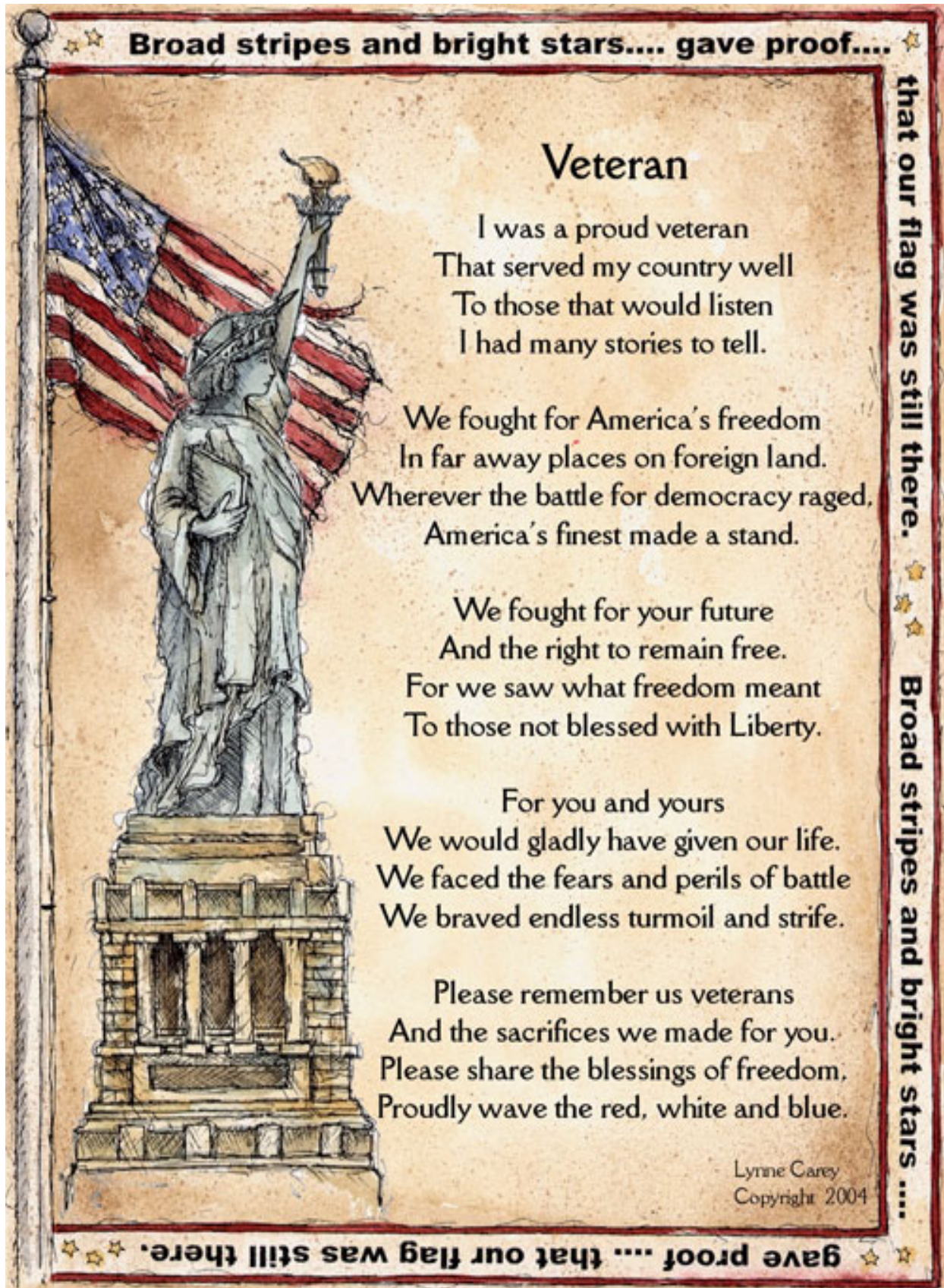
