## Here's a bit of history...

Hours after Pearl Harbor was bombed on December 7, 1941, the Secret Service found themselves in a bind. President Franklin D. Roosevelt was to give his Day of Infamy speech to Congress on Monday, and although the trip from the White House to Capitol Hill was short, agents weren't sure how to transport him safely.

At the time, Federal Law prohibited buying any cars that cost more than \$750, so they would have to get clearance from Congress to do that, and nobody had time for that. One of the Secret Service members, however, discovered that the US Treasury had seized the bulletproof car that mobster Al Capone owned when he was sent to jail in 1931. They cleaned it, made sure it was running perfectly and had it ready for the President the next day.

Al Capone's 1928 Cadillac V-8 Town Sedan became the President's Limo in December, 1941.

Mechanics are said to have cleaned and checked each feature of the Caddy well into the night of December 7<sup>th</sup>, to make sure that it would run properly the next day for the Commander in Chief. And run properly it did. It had been painted black and green to look identical to Chicago's police cars at the time. To top it off, the gangster's 1928 Cadillac Town Sedan had 3,000 pounds of armor and inch-thick bulletproof windows. It also had a specially installed siren and flashing lights hidden behind the grille, along with a police scanner radio.

Footnote: The car sold at auction in 2012 for \$341,000.00.

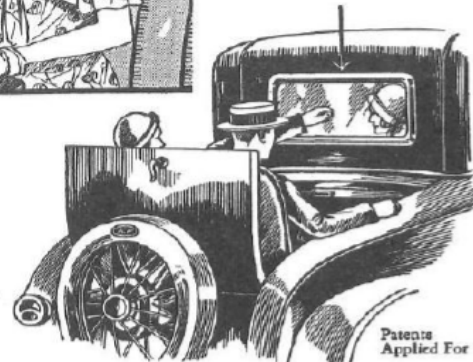

## Jim's Technical Tip

by Jim Cannon,

There are several places on a Model A where you are installing something that is attached with multiple screws. For example, here are a few:



- ☐ Instrument panel
- ☐ Floor boards
- ☐ Valve cover (under exhaust manifold)
- ☐ Oil pan
- ☐ Window trim

When installing them, start each screw with only a few threads. Leave them all pretty loose to start. Then you can move the piece around, as needed, to finesse each subsequent screw into the next threaded hole. The last ones are often the hardest to get aligned. I use an awl in the hole where the screw will be going to adjust the piece to get the holes to line up.



Get all of the screws started, and then go around and tighten them all up in several passes. Have the screw head just touching the piece at first, then make them all snug, then make them all fully tightened. Just like you do when tightening head nuts, start with tightening the screws in the middle and then work your way out to the ends. Alternate sides left and right as you go on each tightening pass.

I hope this helps you get things together a bit faster and easier next time.

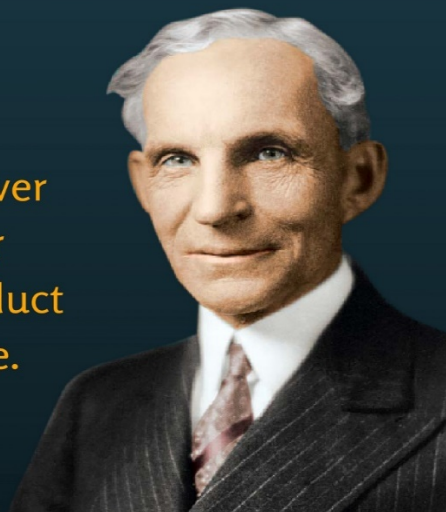

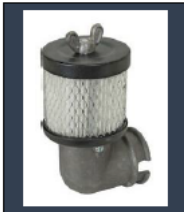
## TECHNICAL TIPS



By George Washington MAFC (author not identified)

"Personally, I wouldn't run any type of air cleaner. Our roads today are so clean the amount of dust you would suck up in 40 years would never wear out that engine. I think if it was necessary Ford would've put one on there. It's not like air cleaners were not invented back then. And they just didn't see any point in it and still they lasted 80+ years now without one. There are pros and cons to air cleaners on up draft carburetors. If you have fuel leaks air cleaners can trap them and can cause huge fires instead of just letting it drip on the ground. Air cleaners, no matter who made it or what type it is, reduce performance by restricting airflow. There are a few good things like obviously cleaner air in dirty environments, along with collecting air away from exhaust manifold leaks. There's probably more I'm not thinking of. When it comes down to it if you must run an air filter, the carb can be pressure

balanced to compensate."
