




Lava Ladies

MAFFI Newsletter Minute-September-October, 2022

As you will have read in the MARC <u>Model A News</u> and the MAFCA <u>Restorer</u> magazines by now the Model A Museum celebrated its 10th anniversary at Model A Days on September 16-17 on the Gilmore campus near Hickory Corners, MI. Those same magazines will have published the MAFFI Hall of Fame (HOF) inductees for the 2022 year. You, however, will probably not read any of the inductee's acceptance speeches.

Howard Minner's became the first person to make his HOF acceptance speech live at the MAFFI Annual Membership Meeting, using "ZOOM" and seen on a big screen television. Below are excerpts from his remarks that history buffs of the Model A hobby will find interesting:

"Two milestone events stand out and I'll make them very brief. Once MAFFI decided to establish a museum, two issues became an immediate focus.

The first was the obvious question of where the museum would be located. I ended up spending time with other Board members, personally visiting a number of possible sites. Among them the AACA Museum in Hershey, the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, the Petersen in California, the Gilmore, of course here in Michigan and the Early V-8 Museum outside of Auburn, Indiana. The latter had been a prime consideration. But MAFFI Board members subsequently visited the Gilmore and agreed this is where we wanted to be.

Thereafter, the question arose, what should our museum look like. I, along with Loukie Smith and Stan Johnson, came together and brought along pictures of various Ford dealerships from the Model A Ford era. By chance, I brought along a May 1929 article from a magazine called <u>Ford Dealer and Service Seal</u>. This was a private magazine for dealers and edited by Mary Bronstein. (Page 40) showed a front face view of a suggested medium size Ford dealership building. That drawing eventually won the day, and that is what you now see as the facade of our MAFFI Museum here at the Gilmore."

You now know, "the rest of the story."

Model A Era Fall Fashion

"Fall is Just Around the Corner"

As Winter is fast approaching, I'd like to show the styles of women's daytime coats from 1928-1931. During the Model A era, women's fashion styles changed dramatically in just those 4 years. Paris and New York were the style centers that dictated the most up to date chic styles that the modern era woman would wear. Generally, 1928-1929, the styles were boxy and straight across the bottom hems with no distinct waistline in dresses. Also, during these two years, dress hemlines were shorter than the early 20's. When the stock market crashed in 1929, so too did the hemlines. They became a little shorter, and many styles had uneven hemlines, or handkerchief sides to give the styles more flair.

Coats in 1928-1929 had hemlines that generally were straight across the front. Some did have thin belts, but some followed the dress fashions of 1929 by having flairs on either side of the coat. Many coats during our era had no buttons but were held shut by the wearer. Furs often trimmed the collars and sleeves in a wide variety of skins. Intricate detailing on the coat was often done with piping, trims, pleats, embroidery, etc. Also note that these coats are just barely covering any dress worn under it.



1928-1929

Compare the 1928-29 coat lengths to the 1930-31 lengths. By 1930, coat hemlines dropped drastically...at least 3 inches from 1928-1929. Waist bands in dresses were beginning to be shown in many fashion houses as well as coats during 1930. Fur trimmed coats continued on in 1930, as well as in 1931. Cape collars were starting to become popular in coats, just like the bertha collars in many of our dresses. Fabrics like wool, tweed, plush, and twill were used for winter coats. Being for winter, coats tended to be fully lined, many in heavy silk satin for warmth. Heavier coats often had padded inner linings for those colder climates. Style, detailing, and fur enhancements continued in 1930. Full fur coats were also very popular during all 4 years, but there were very few styles that were belted. Most used buttons or hook and eyes to keep the fronts closed.

In 1931 it appears that hemlines dropped even further, possibly another 2 inches. Belts became wider and bolder in appearance on coats. Raglan/dolman sleeves were becoming more prevalent in fashions as well as coats. Fabrics still remained the same in all 4 years as well as coats being trimmed in all kinds of animal pelts.


More great Model A help from modelabasics.com:

What is a Condenser and How Does it Work?



A condenser is a part of the electrical system of the Model A. This small tube-like part is found as a component of the distributor. If you look at the bottom of the distributor, you will see the end of the condenser sticking out from the lower part of the distributor housing. It looks like such a small part, but


without it, your Model A will not run!





The condenser works in conjunction with the rest of the ignition system. Its basic function is to reduce the spark at the points at exactly the right time as they open and close. It does this by providing a place for the system to momentarily hold voltage when the points are open. The condenser absorbs

the energy temporarily and prevents arcing between the points each time they open. This minimizes burning and pitting on the points. The energy is then released to assist in the next cycle of the ignition firing system.





The electrical system of a Model A is a complex system of which a condenser is just one part required to work properly. If you want to learn more, go to ModeABasic.com. They have wonderful animated drawings and much more info then I can include here!

GRILLING TURKEY IS GREAT, BUT HENRY FORD'S HOSPTIAL

WANTS TO GIVE YOU SOME TIPS

Grilling meat to create that great grilled flavor also creates cancer-causing chemicals called heterocyclic amines (HCAs). To add insult to injury, when fat and juices drip into the grill, the flames and smoke that result coat the meat in another cancer-causing chemical called polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs). So it's almost like dousing your dinner in cigarette smoke. You can significantly reduce the number of cancer-causing chemicals you ingest by following these grilling tips.


<u>Trim the fat</u>. The less fat you grill, the lower your exposure to harmful chemicals. Lower-fat meats, like turkey, are superior for grilling than fatty ones. You can also cover the grill with aluminum foil - or wrap your meet in foil - to prevent drippings from hitting the flaming coals.


<u>Choose a marinade.</u> Studies show that bathing food in an acidic marinade or a rub/marinade combination, can reduce the number of carcinogens on your plate. Choose an acid like lemon or lime juice, red wine vinegar or wine in your marinade to help breakdown the meat.

Consider pre-cooking. If you partially cook a large cut of meat in the oven or microwave before finishing on the grill, you'll reduce the amount of time and exposure to chemicals. Just make sure the turkey reaches 165 degrees and transfer food immediately to the grill.

<u>Use a gas grill.</u> Gas grills allow for better temperature control. If you like to use a charcoal grill, make sure you have a squirt bottle of water to contain the flames if need be. For gas grills, light the outer burners only (not the center one) and cook food in the center with the lid closed. For both types, cook to the side of the flame, not directly on top.


