
MAFCA Information

The Club Needs Volunteers for 2023 Officers President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and Member at Large.


Oh yes, the **Club Newsletter Editor** is resigning his appointed position effective December 2022 after 11 years of service.

When you pee is slow and control is no more...


Be careful driving our Model A Tudor.

You will still have memories of your Model A and years of fun!!







Tech Notes

What the Heck is a Babbitt!

Babbitt!! What a fun word to say! But do you know what it actually means and how it relates to your Model A? A Babbitt bearing is also known as a sleeve bearing. A bearing is a machine part in which another part turns or slides.

The word Babbitt comes from the name of the person who first developed this system of metal alloys in 1839, Isaac Babbitt. The actual Babbitt is the metal alloy (mix) that lines the inside of pieces that hold certain rotating parts in the Model A such as the crankshaft.

The Babbitt metal used in Model A bearings is tin-based, with copper and antimony mixed in. 'The tin provides the sliding effect, in combination with the oil lubricating the parts.

Tiny amounts of the tin wear away through use, and is washed away by the oil. This is why you'll hear things like "the Babbitt is shot, time for a rebuild!" The soft tin has worn away, making the lining bigger and looser which causes problems keeping the parts aligned.

To replace this material, the old soft metal lining (the Babbitt) must be melted out, and new Babbitt metal melted with a metal forge and poured in place.

The process is hot and dirty, and has multiple steps to get it right. Just a few of the steps are pictured here. But there are several videos on YouTube showing the process:

Jim's Tech Tips

"Infrared (IR) Thermometer Guns"


These little IR thermometer guns are amazing. I use mine to check coolant temperature at the outlet of the engine, look for cool spots on radiators, check tire sidewall temperatures, and to see if all of my brake drums are at about the same temperature after a hard brake (to confirm even braking action at each wheel).

If you are going to get a reliable, consistent, and reproducible reading with these guns, you need to understand a bit about how they work. When you aim the gun at something and press the button to read the temperature, the gun reports to you the average temperature of everything within its "Field of View".

Field of View

The meter's field of view is 12:1, meaning that if the meter is 12 inches from the target, the diameter of the object under test must be at least 1 inch. Other distances are shown in the diagram below. Make sure that the target is larger than the unit's spot size. The smaller the target, the

closer you should be to it. When accuracy is critical, make sure the target is at least twice as large as the spot size.

If you want to read the temperature with a spot circle diameter of $\frac{1}{2}$ " (a very handy size), you must hold the gun 6" from the object. I have seen some guys hold the gun several feet from a radiator hose and not understand why the reading is so low; their 3" diameter spot circle includes a lot of cool air on either side of the radiator hose. Get in the habit of holding the gun up close to the object for the best readings.

Some guns have a laser pointer built in that helps you see where the temperature readings are being taken. The laser does not read the temperature, it just helps you see where the reading is from. You have to visualize the spot circle size, depending on how far the gun is from the object.

I hope this helps you get more out of your IR thermometer. If you don't have one, they are handy to have around the shop and on the road.
