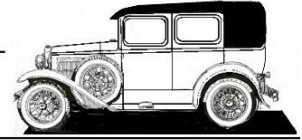

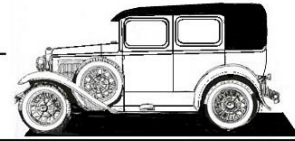

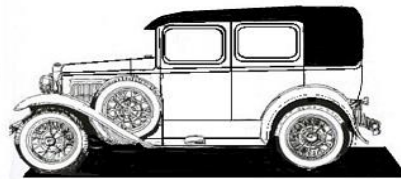
REFRESHMENTS: Thanks to Dian Lane!!!

WE NEED YOU TO GET INVOLVED

It is that time of year, Elections are at this Saturday, the November 4th meeting, and we need you to get involved.

We have five Board Member Positions; President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Member at Large. These positions are all elected by the membership. We also have two non-Board Member positions; Editor and Webmaster. These positions are appointed by the Board Members. And there are several volunteer committee chair positions; Community Service Coordinator, NW Regional Representative, Public Relations, Refreshments Coordinator and Sunshine Coordinator.

In brief, the duties of the Board Member Positions are as follows:

The President must have held a Board or Committee position for one year, been a club member for at least two years and attended an overnight tour during that time. As President, they supervise, direct and control all business affairs of the club and Board of Directors. They lead all membership meetings and are responsible for the Presidents Tour and End of the Year Banquet.

Vice President duties include assisting the President throughout the year. As Vice President, you also serve as the Tour Director, in charge of all monthly club tours, but only planning half of them.

The Treasurer is responsible for all of the clubs accounting; deposits and transactions, reporting monthly financial statements and maintaining records of all of the clubs assets and liabilities.

The Member at Large duties include being the liaison between the general membership and the Board of Directors, as well as assisting the Tour Director and planning half of the monthly club tours.

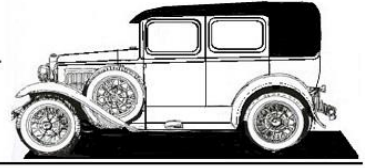

23 - The New York Stock Exchange had to shut down for a day to process a backlog of 6.9 million transactions.

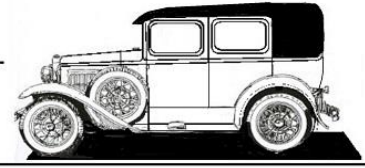

1- The Detroit–Windsor Tunnel opened.

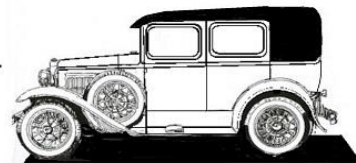
21 - Douglas MacArthur was sworn in as Chief of Staff of the United States Army.

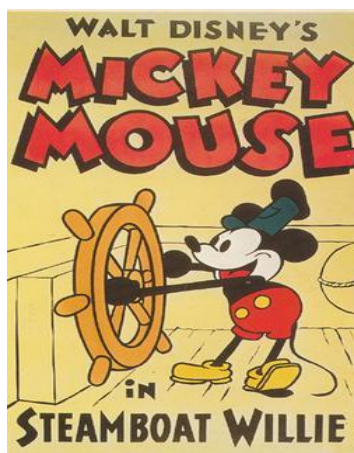

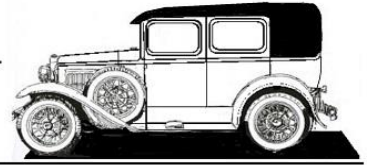
4 - The comedy-drama film *The Haunted House* was released. The film had no dialogue, but did feature a synchronized Vitaphone soundtrack with music and sound effects.

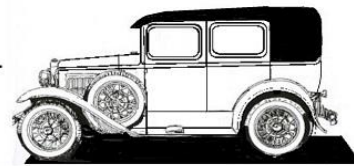
Front End Toe-In Alignment Check

There has been many articles written on the front-end toe-in alignment. Also there has been many forum threads mentioning front end alignments, using many different methods for measuring. However, one is talking about a very accurate horizontal distance of $\pm 1/32$ " above or below $1/16$ " provided closer at the front of the front tires than at the rear of the front tires, when both measurements are taken at 6" above the floor.

Without having front end alignment tools & equipment, and with wobbly Model A tires, each wobbling $\pm 1/16$ " or more from left to right, it appears difficult to accurately acquire a $\pm 1/32$ " measurement with some already described front end alignment methods. Using for example, sliding curtain rods, a nail mark on a chalk line drawn on the tire's circumference center, sliding sticks, or what not, placed on in-sides of tires. Maybe this method or a similar toe-in method has been already mentioned, but this is just another accurate way that "works" to check front end toe-in alignment.



This article was written by H. L. Chauvin and posted on the Ford Barn blog page in May of 2010. He was a very active blogger on the Ford Barn, Vintage Ford Forum and the Farmall Cub websites. In the opinion of many, there are a lot of different ways to accomplish this task, But the overall opinion was that this was possible the best way.



Materials Needed:

1. **Six (6) Inch Vertical Marking Tool:** Obtain a scrap piece of plywood, 1x4, 2x4, sheet metal, or whatever & squarely cut both ends to measure 6" long when held vertically above the floor.
2. **Marking/Masking Tape:** Roll of beige or blue painter's masking tape approximately 1" to 2" wide.
3. **Fine Tipped Marking Pen:** With a bright red or black contrasting color, get either a "fine" felt tip marker, or "extra fine" ball point marking pen, or a very sharp pencil, because two (2) marks with a dull point can easily equal 1/16" or even more.
4. **Horizontal Wood Stick or Metal Rod or Bar:** Minimum 6 feet long metal, or wood 1x2, 1x4, 2x4, or whatever; rather than a tape measure that is bent or sagging when held, or having the typical +/- 1/16" loose hook on the end of the tape. Place a piece of marking/masking tape on horizontal metal or wood stick or bar for possible multiple subsequent markings & measurements.

Measuring:

1. While holding the above mentioned 6" long vertical marking tool vertically next to the front center of both front tires, first apply about a 5"-7" long piece of tape on the circumference of the tire centers; & mark tape with a horizontal line 6" above the floor on both front tires.
 2. Next provide a vertical mark on same tire tape close to center of the two (2) front tires, intersecting the already marked horizontal line with a vertical line.
- (Note: These two (2) accurately marked lines on tape stuck to tires, (reassembling fine lined cross-hairs), will not be subject to moving like curtain rods, or any other tool(s) or measuring device(s) placed between sides of tires.)
3. With wood or metal shims, or a helper, place horizontal 6 feet long measuring device adjacent to marks on the tape on the tires & mark the horizontal 6 feet long device at centerlines of both tires. Insure if marked on wood, to provide both marks 90 degrees across the flat surface.
 4. Roll vehicle forward approximately 3 feet to where horizontal marks on tapes are 6" above the floor on the "rear" sides of front tires & mark horizontal device again to check to see if the front centers of tires are 1/16", (+/- 1/32") closer together than that measured at rear.
 5. Adjust toe-in if required.
 6. One can also apply tape at other different locations on front tires to check & measure toe-in at different tire locations if so desired.

In honor of Thanksgiving I give you a Cranberry Relish recipe from SimpleJoy.com.

Cranberry Relish Ingredients - You literally only need three ingredients for Cranberry Relish.

12 ounces Fresh Cranberries: Take a good look at the bag and make sure that most of the cranberries are nice and plump. Give them a good rinse before making this recipe and pick out any cranberries that are wilted.

1 orange (or 2 teaspoons orange zest and 1/4 cup orange juice).

½ cup Sugar: This recipe does call for a decent amount of sugar. My feeling is that we only have this once a year, so we better go for it. You can always start with less sugar and add more.

How to Make Cranberry Relish

Add the cranberries to a food processor. Make sure to not over pulse your cranberries. If you don't have a food processor, you can use a grinder (stand alone or one you attach to a stand mixer) or a blender.

Mix in the remaining ingredients. Stir in the sugar, orange zest, and orange juice.

Allow to marinate. While you can eat this right away, it is best if it sits for at least an hour.

Cranberry Relish Variations - If you want to change things up there are a few things you could try. I wouldn't recommend trying all of these! **Pick one variation.** I love experimenting with recipes.

Add **apple slices** to the food processor when you chop the cranberries. Or pull in another flavor completely by adding **pear slices**. Be sure to choose a pear that is still somewhat firm.

Really take things down a different path by adding a few **fresh jalapeño slices**.

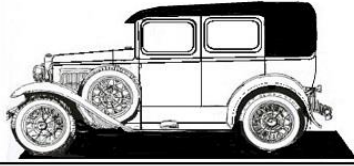
Add the orange zest, but not the orange juice and replace that with **pomegranate juice**.

Throw in a **pinch of cinnamon** at the very end.

Kick it all up a little by adding a shot of orange liqueur, such as **Cointreau**.

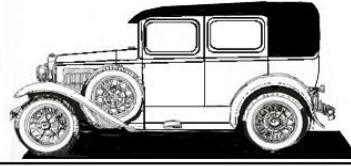

Presidents News



MAFCA once again had a presence at the Hershey Swap Meet in Hershey, PA from October 3 – 6. Office Manager Sandra Aguirre along with Chet Wojick Sr, Doug & Nan Linden, Kay Lee, Jay McCord and Wayne Champagne led the charge manning the tent and providing daily seminars on relevant Model A topics. By all accounts they did a great job. Thanks to all for their service to MAFCA and especially to Jay McCord for filling a vacancy on short notice.

MAFCA History: As I'm writing this article, I notice on my calendar that MAFCA's annual anniversary is just a few days away. Saturday, October 21 marks our 66th Annual Anniversary. I went back to the first Restorer newsletter published May/June 1956 for some "current" information about the beginnings. Originally MAFCA was formed as the Model A Restorers Club of Southern California, with Art Miller as president, and was part of the Model A Restorers Club of West Hartford, Connecticut which was formed in 1952. Mr. Art Grow gathered 15 members and met on October

21 1955 to start the process of forming a MARC regional club in Southern California. By late 1956, there were 34 members centered in Southern California. The 1st Annual Award Dinner was held at Sailee's Restaurant. Located across the street from NBC Burbank, the restaurant was noted for hosting television luminaries and stars.

On October 21, 1957, the MARC SC spun off from MARC and became Model A Ford Club of America. First mention of the current MAFCA logo is in Nov/Dec 1958. The 3rd Annual Business Meeting lists 1086 members. With a yeoman's amount of work done between 1956 and 1958, MAFCA was establishing itself as a stand alone club with a growing membership. From 15 members and one chapter, as of August 2023, membership has grown to 10,550 in the U.S. and 283 Internationally. With 245 Chapters, MAFCA is now the largest car club in the U.S. dedicated to a single model automobile.

To continue with this great success, all you need to do is remain committed to the Model A hobby and to MAFCA as the Model A club of choice. Stay involved with your local club activities and assume a leadership role if possible. We need new and committed leadership at all levels in order to maintain our relevancy in today's fast-moving, jet age society. Commit in the coming year to introduce our hobby to someone outside the hobby and by all means interface with our youth.
